SEAL ORIGIN DISCLOSED

A student in one of the high school classes recently asked the teacher where the school seal originated. The teacher, in turn, asked the Alumni Association. The student's interest then became the interest of the Association. Down through the decades the seal has become an accepted part of our school heritage but few people seemed to have any information regarding its creation.

The <u>ALUMNI PRESS</u> decided to do a little historical research and find out about the origin of the seal. Oddly enough, it was not too difficult. That's because one of the original designers, Logan Kirk ('26), still resides in Oakmont. Logan remembers the beginning as if it were yesterday and he was happy to share the information with us.

In 1925, the Superintendent of Schools, Dr. J. Frank Carter, wanted a seal to identify the "new" high school on Darby Road. He asked two juniors, Logan Kirk and Allan Dow, to draw up the seal, which they did in their senior year.

Although the seal was officially adopted in 1926, both Kirk and Dow had graduated before the first printing of the seal became a part of Haverford's history in 1927.

When looking closely at the seal it is noted that the words "HONOR", "TRUTH", "HEALTH" and "SERVICE" are across the bottom. Kirk explained that these terms were taken from the letters "H-T-H-S" which stand for "Haverford Township High School."

Getting into the spirit of the research, Mel Drukin, principal, was able to locate the original draft and sketch of the 62-year-old seal. The Alumni Association hopes to have this original framed and located in a suitable place in the school. The belated thanks of all Haverford grads go to Logan Kirk and Allan Dow (deceased) for their efforts in creating this lasting part of HHS history.
